MUSICAL NOTES from Lori

This week in worship, we will sing *Faith of Our Fathers* as our Hymn of Reflection. The text – written by the British theologian and noted hymnist, Frederick William Faber (b. 1814) was the founder of a society called the Wilfridians – a religious society living in common without vows. Faber, writing over 150 texts for hymns, contributed much to the creation of poetry for this genre (thus the reason he is/was known as a ‘hymnist’). As found in the title of the hymn, the text speaks of “faith of our fathers.” In the original context, the ‘fathers’ referred to is the abundant trust in a heavenly father (not earthly father). The life’s work and mission of Frederick Faber was simply to write poetry texts he thought would be helpful to his fellow Christians.

The composer of the music for the hymn, Henri Hemy (b. in England in 1818), spent most of his life at sea as a young man. After emigrating to Australia with his family he later returned to England and spent his musical life as organist, professor of music, pianist, composer, and singer (he was a baritone). The text of our Hymn of Response, combined with the creative musical setting by Henri Hemy, is perhaps one of our most adored to sing together by Christians.
